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# Colorado Opportunity Scholarship Initiative approves 12 new local scholarship proposals; \$7 million in additional funds available for 2017-2018

DENVER, March 28, 2017 – The Colorado Scholarship Initiative board approved twelve local scholarship proposals that will grow into a total of \$3.9 million and announced another \$7 million in funds for the 2017-2018 grant cycle.

The board awarded nearly \$2 million to the groups—including counties, institutions of higher education and workforce development organizations—to form local scholarship programs that match funds one-to-one.

"Our goal is to leverage another \$7 million in state funds this year to generate a total of \$14 million in new scholarship funds for Colorado students," said Shelley Banker, director of the Colorado Opportunity Scholarship Initiative. "Between this review period and November, we have achieved 60 percent of that goal. There has been quite a bit of interest from counties and institutions to reapply for funding, so we're thrilled the board also approved additional grant funding for next year."

The program expects approximately 30 more counties and at least three more institutions of higher education to apply for funding in May 2017. The additional \$7 million in funds will support program growth across the state in the next year.

"We're already seeing great results from our existing scholarship programs and are eager to expand our reach to even more Colorado students," said Dr. Kim Hunter Reed, executive director of the Colorado Department of Higher Education and executive director of the Colorado Opportunity Scholarship Initiative. "As we look to increase attainment and make college more affordable, these scholarships help bridge the gap while creating positive change in students' communities."

This is the third proposal review period for 2016-2017. The last opportunity is May 2017.

The 12 awards represent ten counties (\$1,549,390), two institutions of higher education (\$86,492) and four workforce programs (\$347,000). Scholarships are multi-year awards ranging from \$1,000-\$5,000 depending on program and financial need. The majority of the funds are available to students over the next two to four years.

The Colorado Opportunity Scholarship Initiative (Scholarship Initiative) was created to increase the attainment of postsecondary credentials and degrees for underserved students in Colorado.
