

### College Enrollment Rate




### Concurrent Enrollment

Average hours attempted









### College Enrollment Rates by Gender, Ethnicity, Free and Reduced Lunch Status




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### College Enrollment by Institution Type Percent of College-Going Students attending In-State and Out-of-State 2 and 4 Year Institutions
