- II. Adoption of last meeting's notes (1:05-1:10pm)

 - Approval of notes was postponed to next meeting.
- III. INFORMATION ITEMS (1:10-1:30)
 - 1. CCHE Retreat debrief (Kim Poast, Chris Rasmussen, Melanie Hulbert, Wayne Artis)
 - Six new commissioners have been appointed by Gov. Polis. Four were present at the retreat in Durango. New commissioners are eager to contribute and very open to learning the job. They are innovative thinkers and come from diverse backgrounds. New commissioners are actively engaged in educational reform in their day-to-day jobs. There is a lot of interest in Concurrent Enrollment, OER, PLA, and stackable credentials.
 - 2. Proposed addition of Lamar Community College to Statewide Transfer Articulation Agreement in Studio Art
 - Victor from CCCS has talked with the VP of Instructional Services at LCC to confirm the frequency of the classes for the Studio Art STAA.



- Why does LCC want to be a part of the STAA now? Victor responded that LCC is looking to expand their program offerings. There has also been interest in this particular program.
- Christina will request a curriculum map from Victor for review.
- An email will go out to Academic Council next week to solicit questions and/or comments from faculty.

3. Updates (and thank you!) on:

- Re-submission of GT Pathways courses (following 2016 revision to GT Pathways content criteria and competencies)
- Submission of PLA course and transfer equivalencies
 - Christina will email individual IHEs for updates on which courses are outstanding (i.e., GT-MA1, GT-SC1, GT-SC2) within the next two weeks.

IV. DISCUSSION/ACTION ITEMS (1:30 - 4:00pm)

- 1. Departmental Guidance on HB19-1206 (Developmental Education and Supplemental Academic Instruction)
 - o Reviewed "Dear Colleague" memo that was sent out on July 31.
 - The Department is currently working with the AG's office to get clarification on what the "no more than 10 percent of enrolling students shall be placed into pre-requisite developmental education courses" provision means.
 - When determining what the "10 percent" will look like, will there be a conversation surrounding equity?
 - The Department is working with different stakeholder groups to determine what should be in institutional plans.
 - Institutions will need to have plans submitted to the Dept. for review by August 1, 2021.
 - o Full implementation of those plans will need to begin August 1, 2022.
 - There was concern surrounding the provision "that English language learners will complete gateway courses in English within three years." It was pointed out that it can take up to 10 years to be academically fluent in a second language. The Dept. will go back and seek clarification on this provision.

2. What are the expectations for a GT Pathways course syllabus?

- The Council had an extended conversation about the fidelity of GT Pathways courses, essentially, what assurance can be had that instructors are actually teaching to the content criteria and competencies that are included in the syllabus?
- Chris indicated that he would ask a question on a SHEEO listserv for academic affairs officers what other states are doing in this area.

3. Update on STAAs in development, and 3R process (Revisit, Refresh, and Revise)

- Reviewed STAA 3R timeline document.
- All 34 current STAAs will be opened for review over the next two academic years (2019-2020 and 2020-2021).

- Breakdown of which agreements will be reviewed each semester was determined by date of initial launch, those most used (or infrequently used relative to the size of the major), those with known issues, and within academic clusters (e.g., arts/humanities, social sciences, natural sciences, agriculture).
- CCCS will have its faculty disciplines groups review their respective STAA at their 2:2 conference in late September and choose which faculty will attend the Fac2Fac meeting in October. They have committed to repeating this process each semester.
- Four-year universities will be asked to do the same (identify any issues in advance and determine who should represent the institutions at Fac2Fac).
- It was suggested that Registrars also be invited to Fac2Fac conferences.
 Chris and Christina indicated that they plan to be very intentional when including academic advisors and others who are involved in transfer work.
- The plan will be to review STAAs every five years moving forward (a regular five-year review cycle).
- Computer Science and Engineering will reconvene in this fall to review drafts of STAAs that were started at the Spring 2019 Fac2Fac conference (engineering for sure; computer science possibly depending on progress that is made virtually over the next few weeks).
- GE Council members will be asked to facilitate discipline groups at each Fac2Fac conference and also lead the 3R process for a particular STAA or STAAs from start to finish.
- 4. Fall Fac2Fac meeting Friday, October 25, CSU-Pueblo
 - The first set of STAAs to be reviewed will be done at the fall Fac2Fac meeting. At that meeting we will also continue conversations about agreements in development (engineering, dance, computer science, journalism, and public health).
